## Preface

Performance notes

The "death timer" from bar 160 requires players to find out their estimated lifespan through the suggested website below, or other means they prefer.

Players are to perform for the duration equivalent to the remaining estimated lifespan they have, and to sustain (briefly) and *diminuendo al niente* the last note they play. If the last note is a pizzicato, this need not be applied and the player may stop playing after the last pizzicato note. One year is equal to half a bar.

Any player that stops at bar 160 should be taken seriously.



A 21 year-old violist has an expected lifespan of 80 years. Their remaining lifespan is 59 years, hence they will play until they complete the first half of bar 189:

Notated (part score):




Bar 84 is approximately 4 to 6 seconds long, allowing the second violin player to slowly morph a repeated quaver into a note of shorter value, and eventually a tremolo. Once the tremolo is produced, the viola and cello players are to play a glissando over approximately one second.



Bars 142 to 146 denote the shape of a  $y = \frac{1}{x}$  graph and requires the glissandi to be consistent in its descent:
